CEOS acceptance of the Greek Supersite

Dear Mr. Savvaidis,

On behalf of the Committee on Earth Observing Satellites (CEOS) it is my privilege to inform you that the CEOS Plenary, at its 30th session on October 31 – November 2, 2016, in accordance with the selection process accepted in November 2012, following a recommendation by the Data Coordination Team, based on the revised proposal you submitted in April, 2016, has accepted the Greek Supersite.

CEOS agencies intend to support the Greek Supersite with the following data resources:

Agenzia Spaziale Italiana (ASI)	COSMO-Skymed: 120 products for a period of 2 years
Centre National d'Etudes Spatiales (CNES)	Pleiades: 20 standard 20x20km Pleiades scenes for the first year, reappraisal for any additional years
Canadian Space Agency (CSA)	Radarsat-2: 120 products for a period of 2 years
Deutsches Zentrum für Luft- und Raumfahrt (DLR)	TerraSAR-X: 120 new scenes + a few archive images
European Space Agency (ESA)	Sentinel-1, -2, -3: no quota as the data is freely accessible
National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA)	ASTER no quota as the data is freely accessible EO-1 (Hyperion) no quota as the data is freely accessible MODIS: no quota as the data is freely accessible
US Geological Survey (USGS)	Landsat: no quota as the data is freely accessible
National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency (NOAA)	AVHRR: no quota as the data is freely accessible

Data will be made available free of charge for the purposes described in your proposal for the Greek Supersite, and on a best-effort basis. Individual data access procedures and applicable license and access conditions are identified in the instructions annexed to this letter.

According to the CEOS approach to the GEO GSNL, CEOS will regularly review the Greek Supersite for progress and continued relevance to the objectives of the GSNL. The first such review is foreseen after two years, i.e. at the end of 2018.
